Christ operates the office of a prophet, in revealing to us, by his Word and Spirit the will of God for our salvation.

Christ as our Redeemer, operates in all these offices both in his earthly and heavenly states.

The question remains what can we offer in return for these great gifts that we have received?

This Christmas let us take the time to worship, offer prayer and to give thanks to the risen Lord for the very many and great benefits which the Reformers rediscovered for us who would believe.

As we go into another New Year let us remember the grace, joy and peace of family and friends that has been so freely given to us over many Christmas Seasons.
